City of our founders: A timeline of DC conventions

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The Grange is rich with history, tradition, and ritualism, and Washington, DC has been there through it all. A meeting of the Founders, held on December 4, 1867, took place in William Saunders' office around a plain wooden table. It was at that table that this wonderful organization was born.

Washington, DC has played host to the Annual National Grange Convention fifteen times over the last 150 years. Eight of the 23 National Grange Masters have lead this majestic organization in session while in the DC area. William Saunders lead the first six sessions, with the first delegate session taking place in 1873.

At the 1873 session, 23 members were in attendance. Over four January days, committees were formed to adopt the Constitution, Preamble, and By-Laws, and appointed to draft the Articles of Incorporation of the National Grange.

1880- The 14th Annual Session was called to order on November 17th by Master J.J. Woodman.

1881- At the 15th Annual Session, Master J.J. Woodman stated in his Master's address that the Grange is Non-Partisan. "Yet the prin-

ciples we teach underlie all true politics, all true statesmanship, and if properly carried out, will tend to purify the while political atmosphere of our country, for we see the greatest good to the greatest number."

1883- At the 17th Annual Session J.J. Woodman stated in his Masters address "I shall ever carry with me the kindest and most fraternal feelings towards all, and the conscientious conviction of having discharged every known duty, according to my best ability. Give to my successor the same support and encouragement that you have given to me. Uphold his hands, and encourage him in his fraternal work, and with renewed faith, hope, and perseverance, press 'ONWARD' our glorious work." Woodman continued to serve as National Master from 1880-85.

1896- 30th Annual Session of the National Grange Convention was held at the Hall in National Hotel with J.H. Brigham presiding. The Seventh Degree was conferred with 83 members on the evening of Friday, Nov. 13th, the third day of the session. George Bowen was the High Priest of Demeter at that time.

1900- 34th Annual Session was called to order by Aaron Jones. Only two founding members, Oliver Hudson Kelley and John Trimble (serving as Secretary of the National Grange), were in attendance at this meeting.

1908- Idaho was recognized as a new State Grange at the 42nd Annual Session held in the National Hotel Hall with Master N.J. Bachelder presiding.

1916- The 50th Annual Session of the National Grange Convention held in the Hotel Raleigh Auditorium. Master Oliver Wilson introduced Oklahoma as a State Grange.

Between these conventions National Grange switched from opening in the Sixth Degree to opening in the Seventh Degree.

1928- At the 62nd Annual Session, Acting Secretary of Agriculture in the United States Department of Agriculture, Brother Renick W. Dunlap, was introduced and he welcomed the National Grange to Washington, D.C. The presiding Master was L.J. Taber.

It has been 88 years since the National Grange Convention has been held in the city where the Founders worked long and diligent hours to formulate the precepts of our Order. As stated in the Preamble, "To those who read aright, history proves that in all ages society is fragmentary, and successful results of general welfare can be secured only by general effort." 150 years of the organization proves that the general effort of our Founders and all the members who have joined following the inception has been relevant in lives today.

These members arrive days before Session to receive more extensive hands-on training from a multitude of presenters in press release writing, interview techniques and other public relation skills, opinion-editorial piece writing, crisis communications, and communicating across generations to using different media platforms.

One very Washington D.C. feature of the program was a presentation Friday night by Ben Wolfgang, a White House correspondent from the Washington Times. He talked to the group, and a few other National Grange officers and delegates or past delegates, about covering the recent election and about how to get press coverage now in a time when rural America is in the spotlight.

This week they will produce and publish articles for our daily newsletter, write press releases and record podcasts and videos. They will be taking pictures, conducting interviews, and be actively updating the National Grange Facebook, Twitter and Instagram pages.

Grange Radio, the Internet radio station that will be operated by volunteer Fellows, was relaunched. The station will feature various styles of music, U.S. agricultural news updates, and personal interviews from Grangers across the country, but this week will be part of our convention coverage outlets.

After session ends, they will use the skills developed and honed during the 10-day program throughout the Sesquicentennial Celebration.

“The Fellows will not only be able to make an impact on their local and state Granges, but also help us promote the Grange in our 150th anniversary year,” Brozana said.

Many of the Fellows agreed that the workshops gave much more than just communication training. They have learned about job skills and leadership skills.

“I realized after that my resume wasn’t as functional as I thought it was, but I’ve fixed it now. This is great,” said Teresa Thomas after the resume workshop.

Josh Barfield said he was very interested in the presentation by National Grange Legislative Director Burton Eller on Saturday.

“His presentation was particularly insightful on the complexity of some of the more hot-button issues in the Grange. What he made clear, though, was that the values of diversity and non-partisanship, along with grassroots involvement with real people on an emotional level, is what will allow the Grange to break through the normal boundaries around these issues and make a positive difference,” Barfield said. “I hope Grange can be a place that puts a face on abstract and controversial social issues – that’s our challenge.”

Throughout the way, many Grange presenters were interactive and asked Fellows for feedback and guidance, a key feature of the program to integrate ideas from more often younger members and allow brainstorming across regions and ages.

“In so many organizations committees make decisions about programs. It was a good feeling to know that our ideas and opinions [on the topics] are valued and sought out. The Grange really does work to bring all its members into the program from inception to implementation,” Corey Spence said.

Welcome new delegates: Eshelmans

Policy: A delegates work

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In a time where policy is driven by partisan politics, the influence of money, and the power of few, Grange Policy shines above the rest as a prime example of what democracy is all about. Long before policy is set, it originates as an idea at the local level. It passes through the ranks of being crafted, discussed, and by majority vote at the local Grange, the State Grange and finally the National Grange. This year 115 resolutions fill the Delegate Binders, that originated in communities spanning our great Country and seek to become Grange Policy. The Grange is an organization run at the grassroots and this is grassroots at its finest.

On Saturday Burton Eller, Legislative Director of the National Grange, took time to speak to this year’s Communications Fellows. He explained to the Communication Fellows that the Grange’s non-partisan grassroots nature of creating policy allows the Grange to walk into the offices of Senators and Representatives on both sides of the political aisle.

A wide variety of resolutions have been sub-

mitted this year that deal with current issues each American faces and sees in the news.

The Convention Committee on Agriculture has resolutions concerning Agri-Tourism, Urban Agriculture and the Grange’s role in improving the health of Honeybees.

The Convention Committee on Education and Health will discuss resolutions deciding the Grange’s stance on the definition of the term “Natural” used in food labeling. The Committee will also discuss the Grange’s role dealing with the widespread Opioid and Heroin Crisis that exists in the United States.

The Communication Fellows will look at the resolutions included in the Delegate Binders and watch the process of each Convention Committee’s review of resolutions throughout this week. They will also ask Delegates who have been tasked with the responsibility of choosing the direction of Grange Policy how they work to ensure that the policies approved this week best represent the Grange’s membership and how they work to ensure the Grange can continue as driving force in non-partisan political action.

Switzer part of delegate experience

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The John Trimble Legislative Experience (JTLE) is a prestigious program sponsored by the National Grange Youth Foundation that provides young members, age 14 to 34, the opportunity to participate at the Grange's annual national convention. Pennsylvania native, Gail Switzer, who maintains her active membership at Marion Grange No. 1853 in Berks County, has been chosen the 2016 JTLE Participant.

As the JTLE participant, Switzer will serve as a voting committee member with the opportunity to share the voice of young members and influence what resolutions from her committee will be considered by the full voting body to become policy for the nearly 150-year-old organization. Only those designated by States Granges as their delegate or delegates, based on the number of active Granges their state has at the time of the convention, are able to vote on policy on the floor.

Switzer said she is looking forward to learning from this experience, providing a youth perspective on Grange issues and potential policy and sharing knowledge about the workings of the Order at its highest deliberative level with Grange members in Berks County and beyond.

"As the Berks County Junior Director, I think this will be a great opportunity to share with the Junior Granges a bit about how the Nation-



al Grange works and how important it is to be involved in the legislative process, both in the Grange and in local, state and federal government," Switzer said.

National Grange Youth Development Director Charlene Shupp Espenshade said while all the candidates were very worthy of serving, she believes Switzer is a great fit for the program during the historic 150th Convention.

"The John Trimble Legislative Experience is a

great hands-on learning opportunity for Grange Youth. During the course of session, Gail will be able to learn about the National Grange policy development process," Espenshade said. "She will participate on one of the National Grange policy committees and assist the legislative department as delegates execute their policy decisions."

National Grange President Betsy Huber, said she has known Switzer for many years as the two both attend Goshen Grange No. 121 in Chester County. Huber, would traditionally serve as a reviewer of applicants for the JTLE program, but recused herself because of the connection, said she is confident Switzer will bring a great deal to the committee she is assigned.

Switzer recently earned her master's degree from Texas A&M in Special Education with an emphasis in Behavioral Analysis. She said she has become increasingly more interested in the legislative work of the Grange because of her job as a teacher for autistic children at a school for children with special needs.

"Working with individuals on the autism spectrum has taught me that we all need to look out for the rights of those with intellectual disabilities, developmental disabilities and other genetic and neurological diagnoses. Organizations like the Grange have the power to see that they don't fall through the cracks when it comes to legislative policy," Switzer said.

2016 brought changes

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Delegates at the 149th National Grange Session in Lincoln, Nebraska, elected their first female, Betsy Huber of Pennsylvania, to represent the National Grange as the 23rd National President for the next two years.

Throughout this year, Huber has traveled to many Grange sessions and meetings to participate and share her goals and objectives about the National Grange. One of Huber's primary goals is improving communication across all levels of the Grange. Under her leadership, the National Grange Office has been able to bring back a

monthly e-newsletter, *Patron's Chain*, available online to all members. Other legislative and membership e-newsletters get sent out from the National Grange Office regularly as well. Huber also sends out a Master's e-newsletter to all the State Grange Master's around the country. To improve Lecturer programs, Amanda Brozana, National Grange Lecturer, has begun sending out Lecturer programs in a box, "which has really helped out communications," Huber said.

Another of Huber's goals throughout the year has focused on improving the financial resources of the National Grange. Rooms on the second floor and in basement spaces of the National Grange Building have been cleaned and

remodeled. The National Grange Staff is working diligently with a real estate agency to rent out the spaces that are still available. "The goal is to have the basement space rented out by the first of the year," Huber stated.

Other financial changes that Huber and the National Grange Staff have made are reviewing all contracts and where possible signing new contracts with lower rates for the National Grange. Some of the contacts include the electric, gas, and security. It's the "little things that will add up, we are working on it and we are getting there," Huber said.

Chuck is popular amongst the Grange members. He helped raise money for the 2013 Fellows, and has had a passion for leading his members.

Chuck also has a very adventurous side. Prior to his disappearance, Chuck accom-

panied Chris on a hunting trip and enjoyed when the two eyed a gigantic buck across the field.

Chris and the Michigan State Grange are hoping for the safe return of Chuck.

Many might not realize he has significant medical issues. He was wounded while on duty directing his fellow Michigan Grangers and lost his nose in battle. Through reconstructive surgery he now has a nose but may no longer be able to smell the sweet smells of the potlucks.
