There are many topics going on today that we do not have policy about. If National Grange does not have policy on an issue, we cannot lobby on that issue. We need good resolutions to allow us to act on things you care about. Help us out, and help your fellow citizens, by telling us your wishes through the resolution process. Check with your State Grange to find out the deadline for resolutions to be submitted to your State Session, and start writing!

Help support your youth program and give Grange Youth around the country valuable experiences that will last a lifetime.



Recognition Program Unveiled for Legacy Grange Families

In honor of the Grange's 150th birthday, the National Grange is starting the Grange Legacy Family Commendation program to honor those families whom have five or more generations involved as Grange members.

National President Besty Huber said it's important to acknowledge those families who have been the backbone of their community Granges, and sometimes their State and National Grange for generations.

"We give recognition to individuals who have been a Grange member for 25, 50, 75, 80, and even 90 years, and we want to recognize families and encourage the next generation to keep up with that and keep that legacy going," said Huber.

Applications for recognition will be sent out to members and an online form will also be available. Applications should be mailed in to the National Grange office. Anyone can nominate family, including family members themselves, but they must include information as to whom of the family was a member in what Grange with clear five-generation or more lineage.

The first honorees will be recognized at National Convention in Spokane, Washington in November. The family will receive a certificate, and each family member can receive a copy upon request.

Loretta Washington, National Grange Sales, Benefits and Programs Director, believes this recognition will mean a lot to the recipients and will increase family pride because they connect dearly to this organization. "They're proud of their heritage. They're proud to say, 'My grandfather was in the Grange.' It's going to be interesting to see how many will come forward to be recognized."

Since family is a core value of the Grange, Washington believes this legacy family recognition is a

great way for families "to look back at their legacy and see what's yet to come with the little ones."

Huber also appreciates the family aspect of the Grange.

"Several couples met in the Grange and eventually got married. So it does bring families together," said Huber.

Huber hopes the recognition program will also bring publicity to the Grange. "They will invite their neighbors and friends to join, thus increasing pride, membership, and exposure to the Grange," said Huber.

She believes the Grange is a great legacy to carry on in families. "Grange is such a great organization for building character, building confidence as a young person, leadership training, teaching on how to be good citizens that I don't think there is another organization that has so much to offer at all ages as the Grange," said Huber.

Washington and Huber both believe that the Grange Family Legacy Recognition program will help encourage young members to stay active in the Grange. "It's training the next generation to be DO·ers, to learn how to give back to the community at a young age, and then they continue that as they get to be adult," said Huber.



Online Membership Database, A Step Towards Better Communication

As many of you may know the National Grange has implemented an online membership database aimed to give local and state Granges quick access to their membership information as well as the ability to add notes, record transactions, manage Grange officers and extract full or filtered rosters. This system, after multiple adjustments and suggestions submitted by those members testing the site, has become a tool that will prove to be useful to every Grange on every level, local, state and national.

The need to identify each and every one of our members and not just include them in the total number of members who are a part of this organization is our goal. It is not enough to continue saying that the National Grange has 160,000 members across the United States if we are not able to identify them, communicate with them or assist them. Having a current mailing address, allows us to identify important and current legislative issues that directly affect your area. While having a working email address allows us to easily communicate those issues to our members.

Quite a few state and local Granges have done a great job with editing and updating their member information. The main objective was to not only make member information available on all levels (local, state "I just wanted to let you know I am doing fine on the inputs now – I have updated 10 Granges out of 25 yesterday (they were the smallest in membership) but went very smooth and a lot more user-friendly than past programs. This new process is so much easier and quicker to update."

As a related event to our 151st Annual Grange Convention in Spokane, Washington, the Grange Foundation will be sponsoring the "Great American Quilt and Handicraft Expo." The Expo, which will be held at the Center Place Regional Event Center in Spokane November 10-12, is the first event of its type for the Foundation in that it has a goal of raising money from an external audience rather than Grangers to support Grange programs and outreach."We are so often dipping into our own pockets and the pockets of our other members, but the work of Granges positively impacts millions who are not part of our organization. So it's fitting that we find a way to bring the public to a Grange event which serves as a fundraiser to aid our mission and outreach," National Grange Communications and Development Director Amanda Leigh Brozana Rios said. The most important part of the puzzle, however, is still missing: Grange-and memberdonated quality handicraft and quilted items that can be sold at the Expo with all proceeds going to support the Grange Foundation."A critical part of the success of this event will still be member participation," National Lecturer Chris Hamp said.

"Every item donated by members and sold at the event puts into the Foundation account essential revenue that will allow us, without picking members' pockets for yet another few dollars, enhance or begin programs that will greatly impact the next generation across America." Foundation funds help to continue the work of the Grange in areas such as deaf awareness, support of Juniors and Youth, the Kelley Farm, leadership, American arts and culture education and training and so much more. If you spend more than \$100 dollars you can specify which sub-fund within the foundation that you would like to donate to. The different funds to choose from are Junior Grange fund, Youth Leadership fund, Kelley Farm Fund, Deaf Awareness, Community and Leadership Development Fund, American Arts and Culture Fund, and the Trademark Protection Fund. Foundation Board member Joan Smith said the Expo "gives Grangers the chance to leave a mark in the Grange heritage by contributing to the Grange Foundation" whether monetarily or by giving a handmade high-quality craft. YOUTH: LEARNING TO SERVE

More than 30 Grangers including Grange youth and young adults gathered in Newark, Delaware for the 2017 Eastern Regional Youth Conference. The event was June 9-11. Hosted by the Delaware State Grange, the event brings Grange youth together to connect with fellow youth from other states, participate in workshops, gain leadership skills and participate in a community service project.

The Delaware Special Olympics coincided with the conference. Grange youth supported the event by cheering for the athletes engaged in the track and swimming events at the University of Delaware campus.

"Community service is a longstanding tradition in the Grange and the youth department," said National Grange Youth Development Director Charlene Shupp Espenshade. "Whether your actions are big or small, community service is about making a difference in the community." Espenshade and National Grange Youth Ambassador Asa Houchin of Ohio led a community service-themed workshop. Attendees were broken into groups and asked to develop a new community service project. "It was amazing to see the ideas the groups developed," Houchin said. "Many of the projects focused on giving a 'hand up instead of a hand out.' They focused on a community need and looked to bring other groups along side the Grange to make

a difference."Ideas focused on using a Grange hall as a community action center, working with homeless veterans and talking food insecurity.

National Junior Grange Ambassador Jomni Tarbell showed members how to raise the awareness for honeybees. Honeybee awareness is a Junior Grange project. The youth and young adults competed in several regional contests. Jennifer Nauss of Valley Grange #1360 in Pennsylvania won the Best of Show Award in the prepared public speaking contest. She will present her award-winning speech at the Evening of Excellence during the 151st National Grange Convention in Spokane, Washington.

HEALTHCARE: WHERE ARE WE NOW?

Taking a Long, Hard Look at Current Healthcare Proposals and Where Politicians Stand

With the news cycle bringing stories of the American healthcare debate on an hourly basis, it's easy to get lost in the thick of policy. While some Americans have been able to follow every ounce of news on the current healthcare debate, the issue is as confusing as it is complicated and many haven't had the time to catch up. Here is a quick overview of the most important parts and what these mean for Grange.

THE BILLS

The Affordable Care Act (ACA), often called Obamacare, has struggled to retain insurance providers within its marketplace. Humana has announced their withdrawal from the system next year, a move which will leave some markets - especially in rural America- with no available providers. By restricting cross-state markets and increasing regulations, critics claim that the ACA will continue to lose providers no matter the circumstances. Supporters of the ACA contend that it is not the fault of the ACA that these companies are leaving. Insurance companies thrive in stable and consistent environments, and proponents of the ACA argue that it is the repeal and replace

movement that is pushing insurance providers out of the currently volatile market. Regardless, the ACA currently remains the law of the land.

The American Healthcare Act (AHCA), often called Ryancare, Trumpcare, or Republicare, passed the House on May 4, 2017. The AHCA was a budget reconciliation bill, which means that it could only truly affect the budgetary aspects of the ACA. After weeks of intense debate and a slim passage in the house, Senate Republicans have unveiled their thorough overhaul of the AHCA and are hoping to draw additional public support with the newer, more moderate, approach to their repeal and replace strategy.

The Better Care Reconciliation Act (BCRA), often called Senatecare or the Senate Healthcare Bill, was unveiled on June 22nd after being prepared in secrecy by a group of thirteen Republican Senators. Criticized for a lack of openness in the drafting process, the BCRA includes deeper and more gradual Medicaid reductions than the AHCA and an amendment to the individual mandate replacement found in the AHCA. Instead, under the BCRA, Americans who went for more than 63 days without coverage would incur a six month wait-

ing period before they could obtain new healthcare coverage. The bill has become unpopular among many Republican Senators. It is unlikely that the current incarnation of the bill will pass and, as such, Republicans have already begun to plan ahead in the likely scenario that they cannot pass healthcare policy in 2017.

THE PARTIES

The Republican Party remains fractured on healthcare. More conservative members have fought for immediate repeal of the ACA should the BCRA fail, arguing that the economic impact of continuing to fund the ACA would be drastic and irreversible. More moderate Republicans are discussing the possibility of working with Democrats to reform the ACA. With midterm elections on the

horizon, many within the party fear that backing Republican healthcare bills will offer Democratic congressional hopefuls ammunition in the 2018 race.

The Democrats have voted along party lines against Republican healthcare proposals and have overwhelmingly voiced their disapproval with the AHCA and BCRA. Criticizing a lack of bipartisan openness in the bills' construction, the use of budget reconciliation rules to theoretically increase the odds of their passage, and the projected rise in uninsured Americans, the party has continued to denounce Republican proposals. It is uncertain how open the party will be to renegotiation of ACA policy should the BCRA fail.

2017 Lecturer's Program in a Box

Alone, any Lecturer can only create so much, find so many experts and come up with so many ideas, but with more than 2,000 Lecturers around the country, there are innumerable opportunities for great programs to be shared around the Grange nation.

This program is open to any Lecturer at any level of the Grange. Lecturers may engage other members or non-members to assist in the creation of the program but must have contributed to its creation, editing and presentation. All programs should be presented at a Grange meeting before submission.

Rules

- 1. The Lecturer's Program in a Box (Program) entry must be submitted as a .ppt file by email to lecturer@nationalgrange.org by October 31, 2017 for judging. You may choose to create this program on any presentation software, including Keynote, Prezi or others, but please convert and save to .ppt.
- 2. Program must have a title slide.
- 3. Program must have at least 10 content slides.
- 4. The last slide of the Program must include the name of the Lecturer who is submitting the program, the date and Grange information (name, number and state) where the program was presented and names of any contributors to the program.
- 5. Submission must include sample notice to the community (flyer, media alert) on how to promote the program to the broader public.
- 6. Program must include in the .ppt file, or as a stand-alone document at least two of the following:
 - Suggested activity (during Grange meeting or directly following)
 - Suggested further reading/viewing list
 - Word search or crossword (saved as PDF)
 - Song lyrics, Poem or other creative work to engage audience
 - Video or audio clip
 - Fact Sheet (saved as PDF)
 - Game suggestion
 - Sample letter to elected official (as PDF)
 - Other tool or idea to engage audience with the presentation during the meeting or as a Grange thereafter

All programs submitted by the deadline will be blind-judged by a panel. All Lecturers who submit a program will receive a certificate of participation. All submissions given a "Quality" or "Outstanding" or "Exceptional" rating will be compiled into a document and distributed electronically to Grange Lecturers as well as placed on the National Grange website.

Ratings

- To receive a Quality rating, your program must have a 70 points or higher average across all judges.
- To receive an Outstanding rating, your program must have an 85 points or higher average across all judges.
- To receive an Exceptional rating, your program must have a 95 points or higher average across all judges.
