### Grange booth/display at fair still an important tool for Order

It's that time again—time for the county or local fair! I love attending fairs to see all the commercial exhibits. animals, Grange displays, handicrafts, and especially taste the food.

Here are some suggestions I came up with for setting up and operating a successful Grange booth/display at your fair. First of all, it must be eye catching, grabbing attention of passersby. Most people stroll by without pausing, so you only have a couple seconds to get your story across. Photos are good, but they

must be enlarged enough to see from the walkway. Tell something about your Grange, but don't make it too "busy." I realize sometimes the Fair requires you to follow their theme, but you should still try to showcase some aspect of the Grange.

Have handouts freely available brochures, flyers, copies of your newsletter, even business cards for your Grange listing meeting times and place. A tablet to sign up for more information is a good idea—

## Youth deadline day is coming!

National Session might be four months away, but the deadline for several awards and contests is just around the corner on September 1.

This year, we introduced a few new awards that we hope to see many submissions for.

The Youth Community Service Award recognizes an individual or a group of Grange youth for their commitment to community service. The nomination can be made by a state Master, youth committee/director, or community service committee/director. State winners will be recognized during the Youth Leadership Days at National Session. The overall winner will receive a plaque.

The information about this award can be found in the 2018 Youth Program Guide.

The second new award is the Junior Mentor

Award.

This recognizes Grange youth and young adults and their service to our youngest Grangers. This award is to recognize the Grange youth and young adults that go above and beyond to guide and mentor Junior Grangers. State Masters, state youth committees/directors or state junior committees/directors may nominate a youth/young adult Granger. State winners will be recognized during the Youth Leadership Days at National Session. The overall winner will receive a plaque in recognition for their achievements.

The information about this award can also be found in the 2018 Youth Program and Contest Guide.

There are also several awards and programs that have been in place, whose deadlines are also September 1.

### Distinguished Grange Youth Program

Does your Grange youth department have what it takes to be recognized as a Distinguished

Grange Youth Program? Only a select few state, Pomona and subordinate Granges have received one of the department's highest honors for a youth department. The applications are available here.

### **GROW Club Academic Scholarship**

The GROW Club awards at least one \$500 scholarship recipient annually. The applicant must be a current Grange member in good standing. They must be a full time student enrolled in a college, university, community college, technical school or trade school. They will need to complete the application, include their official transcripts, a letter of recommendation from their subordinate Grange leader that is not a relative, a letter of recommendation from their state Master and a letter of recommendation from a source other than a relative. The scholarship application can be found in the 2018 National Grange Youth Handbook or online.

### Horizon Leadership Ambassador/Young Patron

Applications for State Grange Youth Ambassadors and State Grange Outstanding Young Patrons are due Sept. 1. Grange Youth royalty have to complete the requirements of their state program, earn three Oliver Hudson Kelley public speaking achievement seals, one John Thompson Ritual achievement award and a minimum of two other achievement seals. They have to attend a regional youth conference in the past five years and earn an 80 percent on the Trivia Challenge. They will also need letters of recommendation from their subordinate Grange, State Master and State Youth Director.

### John Trimble Legislative Experience

One or two Grange youth could be selected to participate in the Legislative Experience. These youth will have the chance to serve on a National Grange committee and assist the National Grange Legislative Department with the execution of delegate body's work. They need to fill out the application, receive letters of recommendation from their subordinate Grange, state youth director and state master. Full details are available online or in the National Grange Youth Program Handbook.

### National Youth Officer Team

Ever wonder what it would be like to lead the National Grange? Grange youth take the floor on Friday morning of the National Session. You could be one of them. Applicants need to complete three achievement awards of their choice, plus one of the John Thompson achievement seals and the Grange Trivia Test. They will also need to complete the application and receive letters of recomplete.

### DOES YOUR HEALTHCARE PROVIDER KNOW ABOUT YOUR MILITARY SERVICE?

Does your healthcare provider know you have served or are presently serving in the US military? Chances are, even if they did know, they would not know the health risks that are associated with your military service beyond gunshot wounds and PTSD.

According to a 2018 Rand study, only around 2% of doctors participated in any kind of military or veteran-centric training prior to setting up their practice. Until efforts that mandate health care providers to be well versed in military and veteran-centric health-care, the burden currently falls on service members, veterans, and their families to inform their health care providers about their military service and any health issues that may be of concern.

The difference between health risks for civilians and military service members and veterans varies greatly.

For example, the other day, I was having some chest pain. It was very difficult to draw in a breath. I called the nurse hotline and was told, "It's probably just heartburn. Roll down your window, and it should go away soon." I knew this was bad advice so I went to the ER. At the ER, I was given an EKG. The EKG looked within normal ranges.

The doctor didn't seem all that concerned, and he began talking about sending me home. I informed my doctor, "I am an Army

veteran." He responded with, "Thank you for your service." It took me a minute to realize that he might not know that, as a woman veteran, I am five times more likely to have heart disease. So, I told him.

He decided to run an x-ray and CT scan. Turned out, I had pneumonia. I share this to demonstrate why it is important for veterans to know the healthcare risks associated with service.

Another great example of the importance of knowing the difference is the new recommendations from the U.S. Preventative Services Task Force (USPSTF) on prostate cancer screening.

The USPSTF is an independent volunteer panel of non-governmental experts in prevention and evidence-based medicine who make recommendations based on reviews and assessments of research. Their most recent recommendation is that men over the age of 70 no longer be screened for prostate cancer because the patient is more at risk from the process of being screened than from the cancer itself.

The USPSTF recognized three major risk factors: age, race, and family history. However, Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange are more likely than their civilian counterparts to acquire prostate cancer, and the cancer is more likely to be a rapidly growing, aggressive form of cancer. Health-care providers generally follow the recommendations of the USPSTF, so unless a veteran identifies their risk and why they may still need



to be screened after the age of 70, the healthcare provider might risk missing the cancer, and possibly risk the loss of life of the veteran because the cancer was not caught in an early stage.

Furthermore, until university medical schools and colleges provide education courses on military and veteran-centric healthcare, the burden falls on us, service members, veterans, and our families to inform our health care providers about our service and what health concerns we might have due to our military service.

There are four important pieces of information to share with your health care provider: a) What branch you served in; b) When you served; c) Where you served; and d) What your MOS (job) was in the service. The answers can provide a wealth of epidemiological information, particularly in the area of toxic exposures.

There are some great websites out there with information to educate yourself and share with your healthcare providers.

Veteranshealth.net has information on multiple generations of veteran health information.

You can refer your healthcare

providers to the Office of Academic Affiliations webpage, which gives informational questions to ask. (https://www.va.gov/oaa/pocketcard/unique.asp).

The Department of Veterans Affairs website is rich with information on veteran health, but it can be tricky to navigate.

The American Academy of Nursing recently developed and is implementing an awareness campaign for healthcare providers called "Have you Ever Served?" Their webpage (www.haveyoueverserved.com) has information for health professionals and resources for veterans.

The time is now to begin having conversations with your healthcare providers. Hold them accountable to know your health risks and exposures during your military service. Educate them about those health risks, and you may end up saving your life and possibly that of your brother or sister in arms.

phone number and email. National Grange has rip cards available for you to collect names and addresses and rip off a portion to send with the person to remind them of your conversation.

Giveaways are sometimes good to attract attention and get visitors to pause, but they can also distract from your main message and of course they can be expensive. If you choose to have giveaways, give something people will keep and use with the Grange name on it, not discard when they get home.

The "Spotlight On—Grange" video is available for your use, if you have electricity and a laptop for continuous showing. However, people do not usually pause long enough to watch much.

The second important part of your Grange display is people. Your display/booth should be staffed by outgoing, friendly Grangers who like to talk to strangers

and make conversation. "Hi, how are ya doing? Enjoying the fair?" There should be no chairs inside the booth! (unless absolutely necessary, and members can trade off times to sit.) Staff should be engaging visitors, not sitting and conversing with each other and forgetting why they are there. It is easy to become engrossed in personal conversations and ignore the public passing by. It's good to have a mix of ages of members staffing the booth, so people see that the Grange is open to all.

Remember the Four Steps to Recruiting Members.

- 1. The display Sets the Stage.
- 2. Listen to what the visitors are interested in.
- 3. Fill the Need—tell something about your Grange that fits the interests they have expressed.
- 4. ASK THEM TO JOIN. Have lots of application brochures handy.

Plan your display with the purpose of attracting people's interest long enough to begin a conversation so they will pause for a time to receive your Grange message. Let me know about your successes and other ideas you have for successful Grange displays!



### WHAT IS COVERED/EXPECTED?

Through the program, participants receive a 9-night stay at the convention resort hotel, free registration, and most meals for the duration of the program. Participants are only responsible for the cost of travel and a few small meals. They are encouraged to bring a small amount of money for snacks, personal items and souvenirs they wish to purchase during their time at the convention.

Fellows must arrive at the hotel in Stowe no later than 6 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 9 and can leave anytime on Sunday, Nov. 18.

This year, Fellows will hear from the National Master, National Grange Staff and Officers, other communications professionals and more. Fellows will produce content for the daily convention newsletter, interviews for Grange Radio and Good Day!™ magazine, take photos, livestream events, and produce short blurbs for social media - and much more. This is a hands-on training with a support from many of the 35 plus previous Fellows who participated. Those previous Fellows now hold many significant offices and jobs in their State and National Grange and often credit the program with providing them insight into the differences across State Granges and the opportunities and challenges to the organization, as well as great motivation for being part of our next 150 years of service.

### **NOMINEES**

The deadline for all materials to be submitted by email to the National Grange Communications Department is PRIOR to "start of business" (9 a.m. Eastern) Wednesday, August 1.

Please inform the Communications Department as soon as you know you will be applying, even if you have not yet completed the application materials, so we are prepared to organize submissions accordingly and let us know who your recommendation letter will come from. We will follow up with you and them if we do not receive the letter in a timely fashion. A committee of the National Master, National Communications Director and at least one prior Communications Fellow will participate to make the final decision regarding placement. Decisions regarding participants is expected by noon on Monday, August 6.

### NOMINATING A FELLOW

\*State Masters/National Delegates, National Grange Officers, National Grange Staff and former Communication Fellows are permitted to nominate no more than two Grange members in good standing for the program. Nominees do not need to reside in the same state as the nominator, however the nominator should have great knowledge of the skills, personality and commitment of the person they nominate.

Nominators are asked to write a letter of recommendation, noting the following:

How long has the nominator known the nominee? What makes the nominee stand out as a member? What does the nominator believe the nominee will bring to the program?

What skills does the nominator believe the nominee can learn or most improve in the program and how will that positively impact their local, State or the National Grange and that they will be committed to assisting throughout the year with various projects at all levels?

### Become a Storm Spotter under the NWS SKYWARN Program





Do you know what to watch for when severe weather threatens? Help keep your community safe by volunteering to become a trained severe storm spotter for NOAA's National Weather Service. Storm spotters report hazardous weather to the NWS, which aids the warning process. Volunteers are trained by NWS meteorologists to identify and describe severe local storms, including severe thunderstorms, tornadoes, and floods.

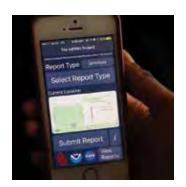

The NWS Cooperative Observer Program is truly the Nation's weather observing network of, by and for the people. More than 8,700 volunteers take observations where they live, work, and play. The NWS depends on thousands of volunteer observers committed to taking observations at the same location for 10 or more years who report weather and climate information on a daily basis using the phone or Internet. NWS provides the training, equipment, and maintenance, you provide daily data! Data from the program supports warnings, forecasts, and helps build a long-term weather history for an area. ### **Use mPING to Report Precipitation**

mPING. (Meteorological Phenomena Identification Near the Ground project). Weird name, cool app! Users can report the type of precipitation they are experiencing. No need to measure! Use the free mobile app to send reports anonymously. Reports are automatically recorded into a database, which improves weather computer models. The information is even used by road maintenance operations and the aviation industry to diagnose areas of icing. http://mping.nssl.noaa.gov/

Join the CoCoRaHS Community

The Community Collaborative Rain, Hail, and Snow Network is a volunteer network of observers who measure precipitation from their backyard. Any age can volunteer. CoCoRaHS sells low cost equipment to help volunteers get started. Observers enter their observations onto a website. Data is used by a wide variety of users ranging from meteorologists and hydrologists to insurance adjusters and engineers.

### 2018 Quilt Block Contest

### Tender Heart

(Credit to: Missouri Star Quilt Company)

Sherbet Pinks / Oranges - 4 colors, 2 light and 2 dark - prints or solids


- Cut 4 strips, 2½" x 10" (one of each color).
- Sew strips together (ALL seams are ¼"), along the long side, to a make a strip set.
- Strip set should measure 8½" x 10". Press all seams.
- Cut strip set in half, length-wise, to make 2 rectangles. Each rectangle should measure 5" x 8½".
- Flip one rectangle around so colors are reversed.

### White

- Use 100% cotton, solid white for the corners.
- Cut 4 squares, 2½" x 2½".
- Cut 2 squares, 5" x 5".

### Constructing the Quilt Block:

- Fold the four 2½" white squares once on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line.
- Place a creased 2½" white square on one corner of a 5" x 8½" strip-pieced rectangle with right sides facing. Stitch on the sewing line, then trim the excess fabric ¼" away from the sewn seam (A).
- Repeat for the adjacent side of the rectangle (B). Make 2 and sew them together vertically.
- . Fold the two 5" white squares once on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line (C).
- Place a creased 5" white square on top of one lower corner of the block with right sides facing. Stitch
  on the marked sewing line, then trim the excess fabric ¼" away from the sewn seam.
- Repeat for the other side of the rectangle to make the bottom of the heart.
- Unfinished Block is 8½" x 9½".

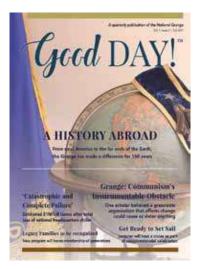

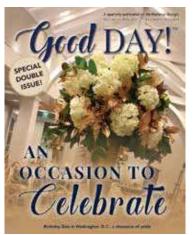
