National Grange unveils new public service announcement (PSA) series

The National Grange Communications Department has launched a new service: Grange Values, a public service announcement series that will provide members with print pieces that provide information and are aimed at informing and advocating on issues important to Grangers.

"This year I had wanted to create outreach pieces our Granges could use as handouts at fairs, posters in their halls, handouts for their members, etc., related to some of our policy concerns or focused areas of outreach," National Grange Communications and Development Director Amanda Brozana Rios said. "Some of this was done through informative advertorials included in the Good Day! magazine about issues like Lifeline and Medicare, however, these are produced by outside companies or organizations and address very specific issues, leaving many gaps in what Granges have on hand as resources that our

members care most about."

"I felt that it was important we were able to produce our own ads that would carry our brand through to their advocacy/awareness raising efforts. In this issue, a full-page and a half-page PSA both focus on issues related to food security.

The first two PSAs focus on issues related to food security. The half-page ad, which appears in this issue of the Patron's Chain as well as the upcoming issue of Good Day! informs of hunger in rural America while the full page gives people ways to curb food waste in their homes.

Brozana Rios said the ads will be available to all members and Granges as PDFs and will be sent to all State Grange communication directors/ newsletter editors.

She said the department intends to produce at least one new full-page ad each quarter and one alternate size per quarter.

IT'S IN YOUR POWER. HELP REDUCE FOOD WASTE.

PLAN YOUR MENU & MAKE A STORE LIST

Take a minute to think through your week - will you cook each day? Will there be a night for leftovers? What will be served with each meal? Planning helps to curb purchasing excess items that just become waste. With a list, you're also less likely to impulse buy (saving money and the potential for items that will end up in your trash).

CHECK YOUR RECIPES & YOUR CUPBOARDS

Know how much of each item your recipes call for and see if you have something already on hand that you can use or substitute (you never know what a little tweak of ingredients may add to your beloved dishes). If you can, cross unnecessary items off your grocery list. You may also be able to avoid the dreaded half-used container by choosing a second recipe for the week that will allow you to use the rest of the product or buy a more appropriate size.

BE SELECTIVE AT THE STORE

If you're going to use produce right away, a bump or ding may be OK, and you may be the only one to see the product's value and save it from becoming waste. But, if it is for use later in the week, that bruise may lead to rot and you'll end up throwing it away. If you think you may not use all of the product or may not get to make the meal you're planning, choose a product with an expiration date farther in the future.

START WITH SMALL HELPINGS

You can always add more to your plate, but scraping uneaten food back to the communal bowl is definitely frowned upon and often finds its way to the garbage instead. You may even see an added benefit. If you have to choose to get more food, you'll also have to assess if you are still hungry, and it could reduce overeating.

SHARE, REPURPOSE OR STORE

Have food left even after preparing lunch leftovers for your family? Consider packaging it as a dinner for an elderly neighbor or asking a coworker if they'd like a homecooked leftover option for lunch the next day. If you have an item left over from a meal already prepared, add it as another side option or find a way to incorporate it into a snack or other dish you're making. Freeze or store food that won't be eaten before it may spoil. Find ways to make the food you prepare find its way to where it should be - into someone's diet, not someone's trash.

STICK TO YOUR MEAL PLAN

If you purchased food for six dinners but decide to skip one, you may start down a slippery slope of letting food spoil.

TALK TO YOUR HOUSEHOLD

Don't stock up on items that no one will eat. Know what people in your household want and avoid purchasing perishable items at times when they won't be used before they go bad.

While military families do not face the occupational exposures their service member does, they do face environmental exposures that are worth paying attention to. The purpose of this article is to help make military and veteran families aware of their possible toxic exposures, what resources might be available to them, and encourage them to speak with their healthcare providers about their suspected exposures.

Vietnam Veterans of America has a long history of petitioning the government for recognition of toxic exposures, including those that have affected children born to those who were exposed to Agent Orange. The VA currently recognizes that children with birth defects born to Vietnam Veterans with qualifying service in Vietnam or Korea might be eligible for various benefits including compensation, health care, and vocational training. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), in order to be eligible for benefits, three qualifiers must be met: the birth defect must have resulted in a permanent physical or mental disability, one of the biological parents must have served in

Vietnam from January 9, 1962 through May 7, 1975 or the demilitarized zone in Korea April 1, 1968 and August 31, 1971, and the child must have been conceived after their parent first entered either countries. The only approved birth defect for the children of men who served at these locations during the listed dates is spina bifida. For the children of women who served in these locations at the above listed dates, there are more birth defects that might be eligible for benefits. To apply for all three benefits, use VA Form 21-0304. If you have questions, you can call toll-free 1-888-820-1756 or 1-800-829-4833 (TDD for hearing impaired.)

If you were a family member who can document your relationship to a veteran who was on active duty while they served at Camp Lejeune and can document you lived at Camp Lejeune for 30 days or longer between Aug. 1, 1953 and Dec. 31, 1987, you can file to be reimbursed for health care services. There are certain dates you can be reimbursed for out-of-pocket medical expenses available on the VA website. The 15 conditions that are currently covered are: esophageal cancer, breast cancer, kidney cancer, multiple myeloma, renal toxicity, female infertility, scleroderma, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, lung cancer, bladder cancer, leukemia, myelodysplastic syndromes, hepatic

steatosis, miscarriage, and neurobehavioral effects. For questions or to file a claim you can call 1-866-372-1144 or go online to https://www.clfamilymembers.fsc.va.gov/. The VA warns family claims take longer to process.

Superfund sites are US land with hazardous waste contamination the EPA has determined needs to be cleaned as it poses a risk to human health and/or the environment. The EPA, state, or concerned citizens can propose a site be identified as a Superfund site. The EPA will then investigate the proposed site to see if it warrants becoming a Superfund site. If the site is determined to pose a real threat to human health and/or the environment, it is then placed on the National Priorities List (NPL). The site is deleted from the NPL when the EPA determines that site cleanup has been successful and no further action is necessary.



Although the VA has multiple registries for toxic exposures for veterans, there are currently not any for family members. If you think you were exposed to a toxic substance while living in military housing, we encourage you to discuss this exposure with your healthcare provider. There may be steps you can take to minimize the damage from these toxic exposures. To best prepare for this conversation with your provider, we recommend before your appointment, write a list of military bases you have lived on, what dates you lived there, and what exposures you may have been exposed to. If you are unsure, that is ok. The key is to start having these conversations with your provider now.


There are also a few new features throughout.

hazard at least as significant as smoking and alcohol and more so than obesity." Loneliness is a common source of distress, suffering, and impaired quality of life in older persons. Seniors in rural areas are particularly susceptible because adult children move away, spouses die, and diminished physical ability makes it harder to engage in social activities. Lack of public transportation in rural areas and inability to drive any longer are also factors causing isolation. Studies show that lack of regular human contact increases the risk of dementia and loss of ability to be mobile.

Even younger generations, though seemingly very connected through social media, report alarming rates of loneliness and social isolation.

The authors convened a roundtable of experts to identify solutions to the problem. They identified four action areas to reverse social isolation, all involving government or public policy improvements: A national awareness campaign, social programs, public policy improvements, and strengthening rural healthcare infrastructure. Again, my answer is "Join the Grange."

Are we looking around our neighborhoods for people—young or old—who spend a lot of time alone? Or maybe they are surrounded by people but just feel isolated? Are we so focused on attracting young people to our Granges that we are ignoring the elderly in our communities who desperately need social interaction? Are we afraid to invite teenagers or twenty-somethings who are separated from their families and need some surrogate parents or grandparents? Let's not make this another problem for which we look to the government for help, surely at a high cost. We are Grangers; we are family, and we have the answer to this new crisis of loneliness.

New Junior Passport available, more coming

We are slowly unveiling new Passports for the Junior Grange. Passports are replacing the Junior Grange badges. They cover many of the topics the badge program covered but present learning objectives and material in a way that is more standard for curriculum development and learning.

The newest Passport is under The United States category, number 14, entitled Our States: Vermont to pay homage to our 152nd Annual National Grange Convention host state. You can see it on the following pages of this issue of the Patron's Chain.

Tender Heart

(Credit to: Missouri Star Quilt Company)

Sherbet Pinks / Oranges - 4 colors, 2 light and 2 dark - prints or solids

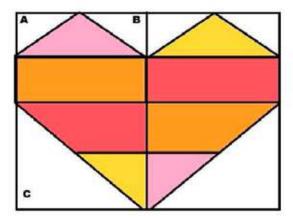
- Cut 4 strips, 2½" x 10" (one of each color).
- Sew strips together (ALL seams are ½"), along the long side, to a make a strip set.
- Strip set should measure 8½" x 10". Press all seams.
- Cut strip set in half, length-wise, to make 2 rectangles. Each rectangle should measure 5" x 8½".
- Flip one rectangle around so colors are reversed.

White

- Use 100% cotton, solid white for the corners.
- Cut 4 squares, 2½" x 2½".
- Cut 2 squares, 5" x 5".

Constructing the Quilt Block:

- Fold the four 2½" white squares once on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line.
- Place a creased 2½" white square on one corner of a 5" x 8½" strip-pieced rectangle with right sides facing. Stitch on the sewing line, then trim the excess fabric ¼" away from the sewn seam (A).
- Repeat for the adjacent side of the rectangle (B). Make 2 and sew them together vertically.
- . Fold the two 5" white squares once on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line (C).
- Place a creased 5" white square on top of one lower corner of the block with right sides facing. Stitch
 on the marked sewing line, then trim the excess fabric ¼" away from the sewn seam.
- Repeat for the other side of the rectangle to make the bottom of the heart.
- Unfinished Block is 8½" x 9½".

Do you love the weather? Interested in actually participating in the science? Well, citizen science may just be for you! Citizen science is a form of open collaboration in which anyone can take part in the scientific process to address real-world problems. You can help by taking real-time weather observations, alerting officials about severe weather occurring where you are, and contributing to NOAA research using an app on your phone.

Citizen science involves everyday people and plays a vital role in protecting lives and property. Help build a Weather-Ready Nation by becoming a citizen scientist!



Ways Grangers can become Citizen Scientists

Become a Storm Spotter under the NWS SKYWARN Program





Do you know what to watch for when severe weather threatens? Help keep your community safe by volunteering to become a trained severe storm spotter for NOAA's National Weather Service. Storm spotters report hazardous weather to the NWS, which aids the warning process. Volunteers are trained by NWS meteorologists to identify and describe severe local storms, including severe thunderstorms, tornadoes, and floods.

Interested? Visit the NWS SKYWARN Web site then contact your local NWS office to find out about free local and online training. Many offices require training, which typically is about 2 hours.



Become a NWS Cooperative Observer

The NWS Cooperative Observer Program is truly the Nation's weather observing network of, by and for the people. More than 8,700 volunteers take observations where they live, work, and play. The NWS depends on thousands of volunteer observers committed to taking observations at the same location for 10 or more years who report weather and climate information on a daily basis using the phone or Internet. NWS provides the training, equipment, and maintenance, you provide daily data! Data from the program supports warnings, forecasts, and helps build a long-term weather history for an area. This program has existed since 1890 and is one of the few programs that measures snowfall and its water equivalent.







Use mPING to Report Precipitation

mPING. (Meteorological Phenomena Identification Near the Ground project). Weird name, cool app! Users can report the type of precipitation they are experiencing. No need to measure! Use the free mobile app to send reports anonymously. Reports are automatically recorded into a database, which improves weather computer models. The information is even used by road maintenance operations and the aviation industry to diagnose areas of icing. http://mping.nssl.noaa.gov/

Join the CoCoRaHS Community

The Community Collaborative Rain, Hail, and Snow Network is a volunteer network of observers who measure precipitation from their backyard. Any age can volunteer. **CoCoRaHS** sells low cost equipment to help volunteers get started. Observers enter their observations onto a website. Data is used by a wide variety of users ranging from meteorologists and hydrologists to insurance adjusters and engineers.





Autonomous Groups, or local and State Granges who wish to hold membership in the Club will require a renewal payment of \$1,000 every 10 years in order to keep their membership.

FOOD SECURITY - One of the most widely used definitions comes from the final report of the World Food Summit of 1996, which said food security exists "when all people at all times have access to sufficient, safe, nutritious food to maintain a healthy and active life."

It is built on three pillars:

- · Food availability: sufficient quantities of food available on a consistent basis.
- · Food access: having sufficient resources to obtain appropriate foods for a nutritious diet.
- · Food use: appropriate use based on knowledge of basic nutrition and care, as well as adequate water and sanitation.

FOOD LITERACY - Understanding the impact of your food choices on your health, the environment, and our economy.

FOOD DESERT - According to the USDA, an area vapid of fresh fruit, vegetables, and other healthful whole foods, usually found in impoverished areas. (Food Desert Map link: tiny.cc/find-food-desert)

LOW ACCESS COMMUNITY - An area with at least 500 people and/ or at least 33 percent of the census tract's population residing more than one mile from a supermarket or large grocery store (for rural census tracts, the distance is more than 10 miles).


