Anxiety and Goals: Making your Grange welcoming to newcomers

Recently in a leadership book I was reading, I came across this phrase: "Anxiety is energy without a goal."

While I am still unsure of the individual to whom this quote should be attributed, I am sure it's relevant and appropriate to reflect upon.

Some have called millennials and the generation following (Gen Z) the "anxiety generation(s)," because you will often times hear young people today saying their "anxiety is triggered" by things like talking to new people, being in crowds, calling to make

an appointment, going to social settings alone, or even choosing their own outfits. These generations have also had highly structured and scheduled "leisure," and experienced high pressure to excel in one or multiple things, be it sports, academics, or hobbies.

To me then, it makes some sense when looking through the lens of anxiety occurring when a goal is unclear, that young people (the 40 and under set specifically) feel uncomfortable to varying degrees when they encounter an opportunity but cannot clearly identify or articulate a desired or expected outcome.

What does this have to do with Grange?

Young individuals, especially, who come to see what Grange is all about or who join the Grange without a familial connection are more likely to feel anxious (i.e. uncomfortable, nervous, uneasy, apprehensive, or even fearful) when there is not a clear goal. This can be in relation to a single meeting, meetings over time or their own place in the Grange.

How, then, can we put these potential or current younger members more at ease?

Start with a clear outline/objectives for your meeting. Consider using the Sneak Peak brochure, or ensuring that newer members have a Manual or copy of the page of the Manual that includes the order of business. You could also make a more detailed agenda following the Grange order of business, and potentially noting some specific new and old business; make sure to include an "other" or "open to the floor" note so people know they are welcome to bring up topics that are not included in your prepared agenda. By providing this guide, the nervous energy that comes with attending a meeting that is not completely familiar to the new member can subside a bit. They have a direction – in this case a goal that is defined as an end point, and a map of how you will get there.

Use committees and subsequent reports of committees to establish a timeline and benchmarks for projects or programs. Even if the young or new member is not taking part or doesn't have great interest in a specific project, providing benchmarks or other items that allow them to measure progress and feel a sense of purpose and movement will reinforce the Grange's commitment to reaching a goal. This can also encourage them to get involved in a project of interest or propose something, knowing that the Grange takes achieving what they set out to do seriously – they will know they are affiliated with an organization that has it together.

Allow them to articulate things they would like to personally achieve (their own goals) and help them find ways to bolster their resume or make strides to improve or act upon something they are passionate about. When the new/young member's energy can be funneled into something they care about and they can move toward a goal set by or with the consent of the Grange, feelings of unease or apprehension about their fit in an organization with great traditions and a sprawling mission will be greatly reduced.

Legislative Department provides testimony on RSV vaccine

On Tuesday, National Grange Legislative Director <u>Burton Eller</u> presented testimony to the FDA Vaccines and Related Products Advisory Committee regarding the need for RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) vaccine approval by fall of this year.

In the fall and early winter of 2022, the unprecedented rise of RSV cases added another dangerous condition to the challenges faced by remaining rural

hospitals, as they tried to cope with the influx of patients needing care but with no space to offer them. Eller stressed that we could again face a quadruple respiratory threat from flu, pneumonia, COVID, and RSV during the coming fall and winter. The committee subsequently recommended approving Pfizer's RSVpreF vaccine for adults over 60. Additional RSV vaccines are in the pipeline from GSK, Bavarian Nordic, Johnson & Johnson, and Moderna. FDA's approval decision on the Pfizer vaccine will come in May, followed by the need for the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) to approve as well.

We are planning for <u>Grange Month</u> <u>2023!</u> One of our special events is a one-night-only return of "**Date Night In**," a favorite event from 2020!


